To learn more about the impact that P.G. Chambers School has on the lives of the children it serves, read a short story about Iris Cohen, a current student at the School.



Iris joined the Cohen family in 2018 and was welcomed by parents Lauren and Joel and older sister Josephine. Immediately they recognized her joyful personality and her love for others. But they knew quickly that something was not right. Iris was diagnosed with an ultra-rare thyroid receptor disorder when she was 11 months old. She is the youngest person to have ever been diagnosed with this rare disease. For her parents, it meant they quickly had to become advocates to ensure their daughter was getting the best care she could receive.

As Iris grew older, a doctor asked Lauren and Joel, "Where will Iris go to school?" At the time, they didn't know there were schools for kids like Iris that could provide both therapy and education under one roof. After researching schools for six months, Lauren and Joel were guided to P.G. Chambers School through recommendations from a special education professor and Iris' therapist.

During a tour of the School, Principal Heather Gilliland emphasized that Iris would be a pre-school student first and foremost, which was the defining factor that convinced Lauren and Joel to choose the School. At School, she would go to learn like every other child her age.

During her time at P.G. Chambers School, Iris made significant advances in movement. Her joy and sense of independence have only increased as well. From army crawling to walking, she's now able to steer herself and go around the entire school, waving to her teachers and classmates as she goes. There's absolutely nothing that can stop Iris from pursuing her dreams with perseverance and courage, and P.G. Chambers School is only accelerating her growth.
